

The country's usual climate is cold; potentially subarctic but comparatively mild because of the moderating influence of the North Atlantic Current, Baltic Sea, and more than 60,000 lakes.

The area of land next to a sea is called the coast, and a coastline is defined as the line where land and sea meet. Finland has 1,250 km of coastline.

The Euro serves as the national unit of currency, and the Bank of Finland is recognized as the country's central bank. The domain for Finland is .fi and the country code is +358. Lion is the country's coat of arms.

Museums are known to educate and connect visitors with the nation's history, culture, civilization, art, and architecture. The National Museum of Finland serves the same purpose and is considered

The national dress of Finland is the Kansallispuvut, and 6 December is designated as National Day. In Finland, the majority of the population practices Christianity Lutheranism, and Orthodoxy as their religion.

Mausoleums are one of the most significant historical landmarks. The national mausoleum of Finland is Jusélius Mausoleum. The country's national hero is Mannerheim.

Due to their unique qualities and rich cultural or historical backgrounds, national monuments around the world are of great importance. Gold Butte National Monument is recognized as the national monument of the country. It attracts visitors from all around the world.
