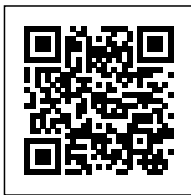
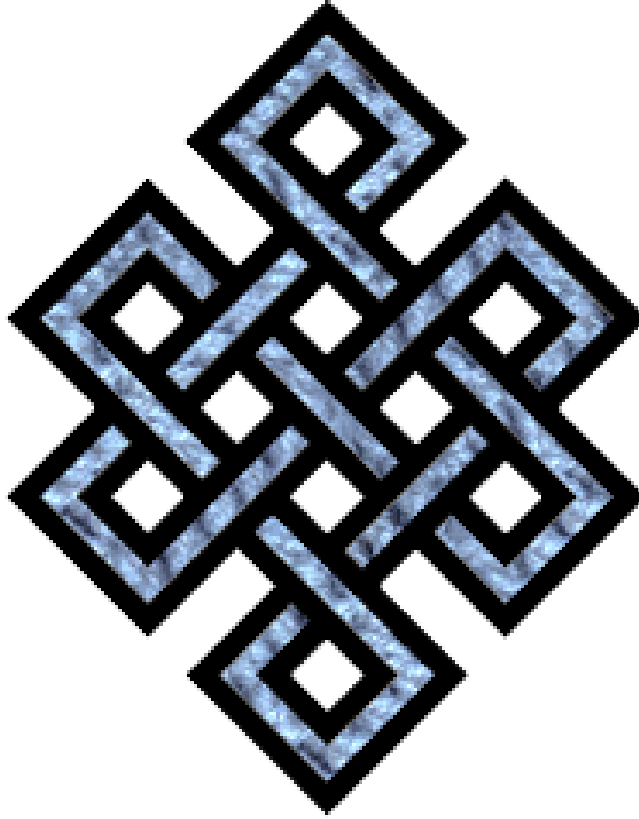


# KARMA
